Re: Meeting Summary - 2009 Updated Study Report  
Middle Fork American River Project (FERC Project No. 2079)

Dear Secretary Bose:

This report provides a summary of the Placer County Water Agency's (PCWA's) 2009 Updated Study Report Meeting for the Middle Fork American River Project (MFP or Project). The meeting was held on February 2, 2010 at the Canyon View Community Center, Foothills Room, 471 Maidu Drive, Auburn, California.

As required in CFR 18 § 5.15 (c-f), the updated study report meeting was held within 15-days following the filing of PCWA's 2009 Updated Study Report. Pursuant to 18 CFR, § 5.15 (f), PCWA filed the updated study report with the Federal Energy Regulatory Commission (FERC or Commission) and distributed the report to the stakeholders identified in Attachment A for review and comment on January 21, 2010. The report summarizes progress made on the implementation of 28 FERC-approved Technical Study Plans (TSPs) during 2009.

### **Meeting Summary**

During the meeting, PCWA provided an overview of progress made on the implementation of 28 FERC-approved TSPs during 2009. The presentation materials were provided to all of the meeting participants and are available, along with a list of meeting participants, on PCWA's relicensing web site at <http://relicensing.pcwa.net>. One FERC representative, Carolyn Templeton, participated in the meeting by teleconference.

PCWA began the presentation by explaining the purpose of the progress report and meeting, providing background on how the TSPs were developed, and summarizing overall study progress to date. PCWA then provided an overview of the contents of the progress report, highlighting any variances that have occurred during study implementation. With a few exceptions, all of the TSPs are progressing as outlined in the FERC-approved TSPs. Any variances in study plan implementation are summarized in the progress report and generally fall into three categories: reporting variances, voluntary enhancements, and study approach refinements. No modifications to the FERC-approved TSPs were proposed by PCWA and none were proposed by any stakeholders present at the meeting. Further, no new studies were proposed by PCWA or any stakeholder at the meeting.

## **Stakeholder Comments and PCWA Responses**

The following summarizes the specific questions and comments that were expressed during the meeting and PCWA's responses organized into three categories: study approach refinements; contingency studies; and reporting.

### **Study Approach Refinements**

During the meeting, PCWA described study approach refinements that occurred during 2009, including one relating to the AQ 1 – Instream Flow TSP. An element of the AQ 1 – TSP was to evaluate the magnitude of flow required to inundate the historic natural river channel at Horseshoe Bend based on 1D modeling. During implementation of the study element, it was obvious that: (1) very large flows would be required to inundate the channel; and (2) 1D hydraulic modeling would be insufficient to describe flows necessary to inundate the historical channel at this study location. Therefore, PCWA conducted empirical monitoring to estimate the flows required to inundate Horseshoe Bend channel in lieu of 1D hydraulic modeling. Specifically, PCWA used a stage recorder near the entrance to the channel, an upstream real-time gage, and a survey of the channel entrance elevation to derive an estimate of the flow required to inundate the channel. This study approach refinement was discussed with the Aquatic Technical Working Group (TWG) and the results were presented at an Aquatic TWG meeting held on August 4, 2009. In addition, the study methods and results are described in the AQ 1 – Instream Flow Technical Study Report (TSR).

**Comment No. 1.** Mr. Tom Bartos of the Horseshoe Bend Preserve asked whether PCWA determined what flows would be required to convey water to Horseshoe Bend via an old mining tunnel located upstream of Tunnel Chute.

**PCWA Response No. 1.** PCWA did not determine the flow required to convey water to Horseshoe Bend via the old mining channel located upstream of Tunnel Chute. This area was not identified in the FERC-approved TSP and therefore was not assessed. The AQ 1 – TSP focused specifically on determining the flow required to inundate Horseshoe Bend from the current river channel, as described above.

## Contingency Studies

During the meeting, PCWA summarized the status of eight contingency studies that were identified in the FERC-approved TSPs. One of the contingency studies involves conducting whitewater boating studies on select bypass reaches in 2010. PCWA committed to conducting whitewater boating studies to refine whitewater boating on three bypass reaches, as follows: (1) the Rubicon River between Ellicott Bridge and Ralston Afterbay; (2) the Middle Fork American River between French Meadows Reservoir and Middle Fork Interbay; and (3) the Middle Fork American River between Middle Fork Interbay and Ralston Afterbay. PCWA's whitewater boating flow study proposal was included in Attachment 4 of the Updated Study Report.

**Comment No. 2.** Jann Williams, representing the USDA – Forest Service, asked whether Foothill Yellow Legged Frog (FYLF) was considered in the timing of the whitewater boating studies.

**PCWA Response No. 2.** FYLF was considered in PCWA's proposed boating studies, as briefly explained in the follows:

- FYLF are present in the Rubicon River between Ellicott Bridge and Ralston Afterbay. PCWA's proposed boating study on the Rubicon River would be conducted on natural river flows, if available, or on a spill event. Due to infrastructure constraints, PCWA will not be providing controlled flows for this study. Therefore, timing of the boating study with respect to FYLF is not a consideration.
- FYLF are present on the Middle Fork American River between Middle Fork Interbay and Ralston Afterbay. PCWA proposed to conduct a controlled flow study on this reach. However, the controlled flow study would be conducted prior to May 15<sup>th</sup> (or immediately following the cessation of spill, if spill extend beyond May 15<sup>th</sup>) to avoid impacting FYLF eggs and tadpoles. This date is based on FYLF egg surveys conducted in 2007 and 2008.
- FYLF have not been found on the Middle Fork American River upstream of Middle Fork Interbay. Therefore, timing of the boating study with respect to FYLF is not a consideration on this reach.

## Reporting

During the meeting, PCWA presented the current reporting schedule.

**Comment No. 3.** Mr. Russ Kanz, representing the State Water Resources Control Board (SWRCB) suggested that the AQ 1 – Instream Flow TSR be revised to include more detail about the methods used to model instream flows.

**PCWA Response No. 3.** The Draft AQ 1 – Instream Flow TSR was distributed to the stakeholders for review and comment on January 19, 2010 with comments due on March 22, 2010. PCWA will address comments on the Draft AQ 1 – Instream Flow TSR in the final TSR, as appropriate, including comments provided by Mr. Kanz.

**Comment No. 4.** With regards to the AQ 9 – Geomorphology study and associated reports, Mr. Russ Kanz asked how PCWA is planning to manage sediment on a long-term basis. Specifically, is PCWA evaluating options for passing sediment through or around facilities as an alternative to sediment removal and storage?

**PCWA Response No. 4.** PCWA is currently evaluating potential infrastructure changes that would allow for the pass through of sediment through select facilities. The results of this evaluation will be presented to the Plenary in March 2010 for review and comment.

### **Next Steps**

PCWA distributed this meeting summary to the stakeholders identified in Attachment A on February 10, 2010, concurrent with its filing with the FERC. Any stakeholder or the Commission staff may file disagreements with the meeting summary or requests for modifications to ongoing studies or new studies within 30 days of the date of the filing of this meeting summary (by March 12, 2010).

Note that any proposal to modify any FERC-approved study must meet the criteria outlined in 18 CFS § 5.15 (d). Similarly, any request for new studies or additional information gathering must meet the criteria outlined in 18 CFS § 5.15 (e).
